News for the friends and supporters of the SPCA Cincinnati



This month, the SPCA Cincinnati announced a \$1.6 million K9 Expansion Project designed to meet the changing needs of our community and to provide a second chance for abused, neglected and abandoned animals. We are committed to re-homing 100% of all adoptable pets. To continue meeting this goal, we need your help to improve and expand the facilities at our Sharonville location.

### Improvements will include:

#### **Expanded Kennel Capacity**

We're adding 50% more kennels to house additional dogs and provide more individual space for dogs per kennel. Let's give these dogs the comfort they deserve.

#### More Meet-N-Greet Areas

To allow for more one-on-one time for potential fosters and adoptions — and outdoor playtime for each dog. This also helps to fulfill the **SPCA Cincinnati** dog-walker's motto: "Every Dog, Every Day."

#### **A Volunteer Services Department**

To effectively manage the 350+ volunteers and give them a work space for special projects.

This will also serve as a safe place for volunteers to store personal property while volunteering with our pets.

#### A Behavioral Department


To train dogs with behavioral challenges in order to reduce their risk of euthanasia. All dogs deserve a second chance, and we're partnering with the next generation of behaviorists at local universities to make this happen.

#### **Key Points to Ponder**

- The current facility in Sharonville, Ohio was built with an expected expansion for the canine center.
- The usable build-out area is approximately 8,500 square feet.
- The current Meet-N-Greet/exercise yard is insufficient for independent family use and is exposed to weather and elements. The new Meet-N-Greet will be under a shelter with segmented enclosed areas. Added bonus: it also doubles as additional areas for behavioral training.


# Where Have You Been, Buddy?

# Partnership to Find Puppies Forever Homes

This past fall, the **SPCA Cincinnati** became an ally across state lines, working with The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and the Humane Society of Tulsa. The **SPCA Cincinnati** extended a helping hand to relieve communities in Oklahoma and Texas that are overwhelmed with homeless pets and a lack of resources. Our shelter took in 29 adult dogs and puppies, including two mom dogs and their litters. The precious pets, who traveled over 20 hours, arrived at our shelter and settled in before getting a good night's rest! Mike Retzlaff, VP of Operations for the **SPCA Cincinnati**, says, "It's an exciting program at the national level, of course we had to get involved. It's the first time we've partnered with HSUS and Tulsa's humane society in this capacity, but surely not the last. We would want the same for us if/when we need help."

- The new kennel space is designed to reduce noise, reduce odor, be more sterile and help canine containment.
- Surpasses the industry standards for HVAC, air circulation, air sterilization and cleaning.
- Volunteerism at the **SPCA Cincinnati** has expanded significantly, with a need for larger offices.
- The Dog Behaviorist needs a bigger space for proper training and for the significant volume of dogs that will need to go through the training. The increase in well-trained dogs ready for adoptions means more lives saved!

The SPCA Cincinnati took X-rays and, luckily, our veterinarian could not find any obvious tumors, fractures or other pathologies. We continued with medication for her worn pads and toes. With months of continued care, we helped to build muscles in her rear legs while treating the infections on her toes and back paws. Butters was ADOPTED after three months!
